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#### Autism Spectrum Disorder—Resource Base

This September Nailsea School launched its Autism
Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Resource Base. The aim of this
provision is for students with an ASD diagnosis and
Education Health Care Plan (EHCP) to have an extended
transition into secondary school life with them ultimately
being able to successfully access the main school full
time. This follows the launch in 2017 of the Nailsea School
Hub for students with Special Educational Needs and
Disabilities (SEND) where they are able to access a

reduced mainstream timetable supplemented by a specialist provision to ensure that their social, emotional and sensory needs are met.

The ASD Resource Base is situated where the library used to be, housed in the centre of the school, where it has its own entry and exit points and has enjoyed a redesign with 'pod' classrooms and open plan areas for learning and support.

Nailsea School Hub Intervention and Resource Base co-exist, sharing these same aims. Each



child's needs are continually monitored and assessed, a flexible approach ensures that the best course of action for each child is adopted. The first of its type in North Somerset, the Hub and Resource Base have been supported by North Somerset Council and is now being recommended by them to other schools looking to improve their SEND offering.



#### **Memorial Banner**



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Some new appointments took place over the past few months, and with each termly newsletter we will be introducing the team and putting faces to the names.




#### **Charis Duckworth - Academic Mentor**

come through Nailsea School so I have seen it from both viewpoints and can empathise with the difficult job of being a parent.

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
#### **Green Tech Winner**



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## **NEWSLETTER - Wellbeing**

#### October 2020 | Term 1

Welcome to Nailsea School's first **Wellbeing Bulletin** of the Academic year. The aim of this bulletin is to share with you useful information, strategies and resources in order to support our students mental wellbeing.

The past few months have been particularly worrying and for many have had an impact on their mental wellbeing. In response to this, the Nailsea School Safeguarding Team thought we'd kick the year off talking about negative thoughts and how to manage them. We hope you find the following information helpful.

If you are struggling at all and would like some support or guidance then please do contact the Safeguarding Team who are available to support you. Alternatively if you are not quite ready to talk to us then please do check out our directory of services on the Nailsea School website. It is full of outside agencies and resources that we recommend.

#### **AUTOMATIC NEGATIVE THOUGHT?**

An 'ANT' is a thinking pattern that doesn't match reality. When you notice that you are having one, you can begin to train your mind to ignore them. Get to know a few of the common ones so that you will be able to stop them:

ALL OR NOTHING example: it's not perfect, so it must be awful' You see things in black or white with no in between. You believe that everything is either right or wrong with no exceptions. You think of things as a complete success or a total failure. This type of thinking sets you up for failure almost always. Give yourself some slack! You are only human!

**PREDICTING THE FUTURE** example: 'I'll forget what I'm supposed to do'

You expect bad things to happen. When thinking of your future, have a positive mind-set. If you imagine yourself being successful you are more likely to have a good outcome. When you picture a negative outcome in your mind, it will often keep you from trying. Stop expecting bad things to happen. You never know what will happen unless you try. Try new things. Be brave!

MIND READER example 'I bet they hate me. They must be staring at me because she doesn't like my clothes'
You think you know what others are thinking. You assume the worst without evidence. You cannot read minds. Don't try to guess what people are thinking. You will be wrong a lot of the time.

**STEWING** example 'I keep thinking about my mistakes' You keep going over something in your mind hoping you can figure out a way to change it. When you repeat negative thoughts or bad experiences over and over in your mind, you begin to lose sight of the positive things around you. Stop thing about mistakes too much. Think more about what you did right. Think less about what you did wrong and focus on the positive.

#### MAGNIFYING

When you let one bad thing define everything in your life. This occurs when you make a big deal out of something small. Don't focus on one bad thing when there are so many good things too.

**PERSONALISATION** example 'I must have done something wrong because my teacher looks angry'

You blame yourself for everything. You think that everything people say or do is a reaction to something you did. This isn't the case, there are many factors.

#### MANANGING AUTOMATIC THOUGHTS:

- Notice the thought and label it as untrue
- Challenge the truth of the thought with evidence or facts
- Remember that positive emotions undo negative thinking
- Distract yourself with something happy.

### Have a go at some of the options below that can help you for a minute or two

- Listen to your favourite music
- Watch your favourite videos
- Connect with someone who's good for you
- Watch inspiring YouTube videos
- Spend time with a pet (your own or someone else's)
- Think about a special and positive memory
- Count to 10
- Take 5 deep breaths
- Phone someone you like and trust
- Message or text someone whom you value
- Watch TV programmes that make you feel better
- Take a break and go outside for a walk
- Take a break by moving to another room
- · Get a hug from someone you trust
- Remind yourself that these intense and overwhelming feelings won't last forever
- Remind yourself that you got through tough times before and can again.
