

Dear Parents/carers

This week's letter starts with some sobering news I have been asked to pass on to parents by the local neighbourhood policing team. The PCSOs have been made aware of a sexually explicit video being distributed among school pupils in North Somerset. They would like you to be aware that the child you have responsibility for may have this or other indecent images on their electronic devices which they may have been sent. They also add:

BELIEVE

SUCCEED

ASPIRE

As a reminder, it is an offence to make, possess or distribute such images and these are very serious criminal offences with serious consequences that can result in life-long repercussions, even if it is an indecent image that the child has taken themselves.

None of us wants to see young people being criminalised so we are appealing to you to check the mobile phone / tablet / computer of the child you have responsibility for and ensure that any such images that are on the device are permanently deleted. In an age of cloud storage and device syncing such content is not something that anyone wants to reappear at a later date as the offence would still be committed at that point in time.

We would also urge you to frequently and robustly inspect these devices as part of your caring responsibilities. If any content is discovered you have the authority to intervene and remove content / confiscate the device for a period / cancel the contract as you see fit. Our personal opinion is that we would prefer to keep a grumbling teenager safe than be criticised for not protecting them when it has all gone wrong.

With the half term break upon us and with more time for students to be on their devices this is a timely reminder about the importance of checking the content being accessed.
